Breed: Short-haired buff tabby

 Buffy came to the shelter after being found as a stray. Although she is a friendly cat, she can be temperamental and will let you know when she wants to be left alone. Buffy would do best in a home with adults where she could get attention on her own terms. Buffy is declawed.

 This handsome boy came to the shelter after being abandoned with several other cats. He is shy but very curious and can be petted if approached slowly. He gets along with the other cats and would do well in a quiet home.
